Day 1: Saint Martin

The French half of Saint Martin is a part of the European Union, with Marigot as its capital. The island, however, is not part of the Schengen Zone. With over a hundred different ethnicities and languages spoken on the island, it boasts a diverse cultural legacy. For the adventurous and athletic, there is enough to do here, from hiking to zip lining, jetskiing, diving, or for something a bit quieter, mooring off the secluded bays and coves to enjoy the serene, powdery, white-sand beaches.



Day 2: St Barths

St Bartholomew, named after Christopher Columbus's younger brother, is a world-renowned luxury island charter destination. If you are seeking for the perfect beach, there are over 20 of them to pick from, as well as superb sailing options throughout the island. The major harbour is located on this spectacular volcanic island, which is flanked by shallow reefs. The waters surrounding the island, which are rich in corals and sensitive habitats, have been designated as a protected area since 1996. Everything on the island is particularly French (despite having been a Swedish possession for over a century!) The natural beauty of the island seamlessly blends with the luxury resort vibe, bustling nightlife, and superb shopping and restaurants.:



Day 3 & 4: St Kitts & Nevis

St. Kitts and Nevis are well-known for their historic, cultural, and architectural significance. Despite their reliance on tourism, the islands are less densely packed with hotel resorts and are among the most charming and scenic in the Caribbean. Nature lovers will admire the preservation of their ecosystems, and the short trek up Nevis Peak, the active volcano that makes up the island, will reward you with breathtaking views. The busy Basse-Terre, located on Saint Kitts, is the islands' capital, where you can learn about the island's history at the National Museum or enjoy one of the many outdoor bars and duty-free shopping.



Day 5: St Eustatius

St. Eustatius, affectionately known as the Caribbean's hidden treasure, was once one of the busiest seaports in the entire bright blue sea. This was where American and European colonies would go to export a variety of goods, especially since Sint Eustatius was a Dutch tax haven. The French acquired control in the late 18th century, and the ships all sailed away when severe taxes were imposed. Sint Eustatius now has a quiet, wild, and organic vibe that tourism has yet to consume.

The beaches are narrow and volcanic, with brilliant blue waves on either side, the trees are tropical, with fruits hanging heavy on the vines, and there are old world forts to explore. Of course, there's plenty of snorkeling and beach combing and the chance to taste eclectic flavours in the island's eccentric eateries.



Day 6: Anguilla

Anguilla is located in the Caribbean Sea's Leeward chain, near to St. Martin, and offers natural beauty and a more easygoing attitude, with the island generally less developed and one of the area's best kept secrets. Because the natives have kept this beautiful paradise free of development, Anguilla attracts a high-end clientele. This Caribbean paradise is famed for its environmentally important coral reefs, which are ideal for snorkeling, as well as immaculate palm-lined beaches where you can enjoy a barbecue and beverage at one of the island's numerous bustling beach bars or anchor off one of the island's tranquil coves.

Day 7: St Marteen

The Dutch side of Sint Maarten accounts for roughly 40% of Saint-Martin's divided island. France owns the remaining 60%. The airport on this side of the island is well known because planes appear to land dangerously near to Maho beach, from which beachgoers can enjoy watching the landings. Philipsburg, the capital, has a vibrant nightlife and plenty of entertainment options, including casinos, duty-free shopping, and excellent restaurants. For a more peaceful experience, visit one of the many powdery sand beaches for some snorkeling or dive one of the many wrecks. The island is home to the Caribbean's biggest collection of butterflies, as well as an incredible variety of plant and animal species.
