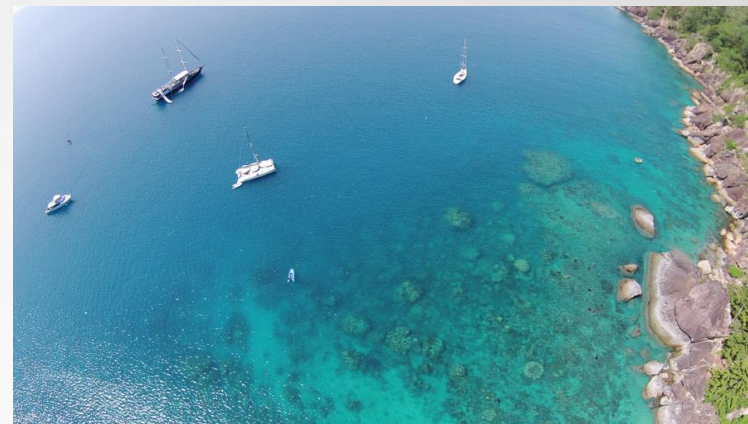
Hook Island to Hook Island 7 Days

SEVEN DAYS LUXURY YACHT CHARTER

CRUISING FROM HOOK ISLAND TO HOOK ISLAND

Day 1: Hook Island

Depart Abel Point Marina on Airlie Beach towards Nara Inlet on Hook Island's west shore. Nara Inlet is a popular choice for the first night anchorage since it is easily accessible and well sheltered, providing a tranquil and restful start to your Whitsundays sailing vacation. If you're feeling adventurous, you can also explore waterfalls, caves, and rock paintings.



Day 2: Whitsunday Island

Sail south down the west coast of Hook Island, through the Whitsunday Passage, and down the west coast of the group's largest island, Whitsunday Island. For the second night of the yacht charter trip, many boats anchor either Cid Harbour or Gulnare Inlet. Cid Harbour is a big, year-round anchorage. There are various sandy beaches nearby, and for the more energetic, there is a walking track or even a trip up to Whitsunday Peak for a spectacular panoramic view.



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Day 3: Hamilton Island

Continue south until you reach the southern anchorages of Whitsunday Island or Hamilton Island. Hamilton Island is a modern resort island with a bustling marina and a superb selection of pubs and restaurants where visitors can immerse themselves in local culture. There are also some specialty shops where you can look for mementos. If you need to hire a buggy to tour the island, here is a nice place to do so.



Day 4: Whitehaven beach

Sail to the renowned Whitehaven Beach in the north. Just a 6 kilometer length of the purest white silica sand exists here; there are no hotels, shops, or even structures. Sand beneath your feet is the only sound you can hear. Here, the water is incredibly clear and makes for some incredible snorkeling and swimming opportunities. At Tongue Bay's northernmost point, Whitehaven Beach, there is a well-liked anchorage. Only a few hundred meters separate you from the platform overlook, where you may snap your own pictures to compete with those on Whitehaven Beach postcards.





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Day 5: Border Island

Head north with a potential stop at Border Island, which is off Whitsunday Islands northeastern shore. Beautiful snorkeling may be found at Cataran Bay on Border Island. Enjoy some of the most breathtaking swimming and snorkeling at Hook Island Manta Ray Bay. The tranquil waters, which provide protected anchorage, are perfect for water sports. Alternately, explore the island's waterfalls, caves, and rock carvings.



Day 6: Manta Ray Bay on Hook Island

Sailing further north will take you to Hook Island's Butterfly Bay or Manta Ray Bay. The Whitsunday Islands' northern regions offer swimming and snorkeling that rivals the Great Barrier Reef itself. And there is always an accessible anchoring that is protected and safe.





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Day 7: Daydream Island or South Molle Island

On your last full day of sailing, you have the option of exploring Hayman Island or taking a voyage to Daydream Island or South Molle Island by crossing the Whitsunday Passage to the south. A marina is available on Hayman Island, a 5-star resort island where you can stop for lunch. Around here, there is also some incredible underwater aquatic life.
